

Founder and Director of the Living Tongues Institute for Endangered Languages, Dr. Gregory D. S. Anderson has degrees in Linguistics from Harvard (A.B. 1989) and the University of Chicago (Ph.D. 2000). He formerly taught linguistics at University of Manchester (UK) and at University of Oregon. He also served as lead scientist on the Enduring Voices project, a joint venture between Living Tongues and National Geographic Society where he served as a Fellow of the Society from 2007-2013. He currently holds a Research Fellowship at University of South Africa (UNISA).

Dr. Anderson has authored eleven books and approximately one hundred peer-reviewed studies. He has published widely in the fields of historical linguistics, descriptive grammar, morphology, verb typology, and the linguistics of Munda, Salishan, Ogonoid, Turkic, Tibeto-Burman, and Nilo-Saharan language families.

Dr. Anderson has conducted fieldwork and training sessions for indigenous language activists on every continent, having pioneered the development of multi-media Talking Dictionaries for over 80 languages to date. He was also the subject (along with his Living Tongues Institute colleague David Harrison) of the critically acclaimed film *The Linguists* by Ironbound Films. He is well known for his 2006 book *Auxiliary Verb Constructions* from Oxford University Press where he established an entirely new functional and formal typology of auxiliary verb constructions. He is currently completing a book entitled *Language Extinction: The Real Threat to Linguistic Diversity in the 21st Century* to be published by Cambridge University Press.
